This letter responds to the Northern New Mexico Citizens' Advisory Board's (NNMCAB) Recommendation 2000-1, which was adopted on February 28, 2000. Recommendation 2000-1 pertains to the Long-Term Stewardship (LTS) Study being developed as a condition of the Programmatic Environmental Impact Statement (PEIS) settlement. The recommendation offers five specific comments on the scope and content of the PEIS study.

The NNMCAB's comments have been forwarded to the Department of Energy's Environmental Management Office of Long-Term Stewardship (EM-51). EM-51 is responsible for developing the PEIS study. Although the official comment period for scoping the study expired on February 3, 2000, Mr. Steve Livingstone of EM-51 has reassured us that your comments will be taken into consideration and addressed in the study to the extent practicable. Mr. Livingstone has also informed us that the draft LTS Study will be available for public comment in June 2000. I encourage the NNMCAB to review and comment on the draft study to ensure your concerns have been adequately addressed. After receiving public comments, EM-51 will prepare a final LTS Study for release to the public by October 2000. EM-51 has offered to brief the NNMCAB on the latest LTS efforts and discuss LTS issues if requested.

This letter responds to the Northern New Mexico Citizens' Advisory Board's (NNMCAB) Recommendation 2000-2, which was adopted on February 28, 2000. The NNMCAB made the following recommendations regarding the report to Congress on Long-Term Stewardship (LTS) mandated by the FY 2000 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA):

1. Provide to the Los Alamos National Laboratory (LANL), as soon as possible, the direction and guidance necessary to proceed with the development and generation of the above mentioned report so that it might adequately comply with the tight schedule imposed.
2. Provide the draft of the report to the Northern New Mexico Citizens' Advisory Board, as soon as it becomes available, so that the CAB might provide adequate review and offer comment before final submittal.

Regarding the first recommendation, Carolyn Huntoon, the Department of Energy's Assistant Secretary for Environmental Management (EM-1), sent out the final guidance for the development of the NDAA LTS Report on February 18, 2000. The LTS points of contact at the Los Alamos Area Office and LANL received an electronic version of the guidance on February 22, 2000. The final guidance had minor changes from the draft guidance transmitted to the Area Offices on January 13, 2000, including an extension of the deadline to provide the data to March 10, 2000.

Regarding the second recommendation, the NNMCAB will have the opportunity to review and comment on the LANL portion of the draft report. However, you should note that the LANL discussion in the report will be relatively short, and will not have significant LTS data. This is because the NDAA language requires a report on the LTS responsibilities for "sites or portions of sites for which environmental restoration, waste disposal, and facility stabilization is expected to be completed by the end of calendar year 2006." The environmental restoration, waste disposal, and facility stabilization work completed at LANL by 2006 will not require LTS activities. While a significant amount of work will have been completed by 2006, the clear majority will not involve the leaving of any residual contamination, a prerequisite for LTS activities. The majority of LANL's LTS activities will be underway by 2011.

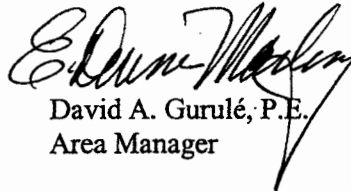

Regarding Locations for Maximally Exposed Individual
from LANL Environmental Releases of Radionuclides

Dear Mr. Scott:

Thank you for your presentations to the Northern New Mexico Citizens' Advisory Board Monitoring and Surveillance Committee on January 19, February 16 and March 15 and the Board meeting on February 23. We are responding to your request for input on the Department of Energy (DOE) requirement to determine the highest effective dose equivalent from airborne radionuclides to an off-site member of the public using procedures specified by the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) under 40 C.F.R. Part 61, Subpart H, National Emission Standards for Emissions of Radionuclides other Than Radon from Department of Energy Facilities. Since, the Los Alamos Neutron Science Center (LANSCE), which had historically accounted for the majority of the total off dose contribution from the Los Alamos National Laboratory (LANL) and which had factored prominently in this calculation, operated at a considerably reduced level during calendar year 1999. This reduction makes it necessary to re-assess the MEI dose calculation for 1999.

The Northern New Mexico Citizen's Advisory Board suggests that the Department of Energy include the following locations in calculating the MEI from LANL environmental releases:

1. Los Alamos High School
2. Los Alamos Middle School
3. Piñon School in White Rock
4. Tsankowi Parking Lot
5. San Ildefonso Pueblo
6. Santa Clara Pueblo
7. East Road Condos

8. Royal Crest Trailer Court
9. Abiquiu

The Monitoring and Surveillance Committee and the Board reviewed LANL's proposed methodology for determining these locations when no single source plays an overriding impact in the public dose. The Board finds this methodology acceptable.

The Board looks forward to hearing your response to our suggestion and is pleased with this opportunity to participate in this very important process.

Fran Berting began the meeting at 6:10 p.m. Paul Schumann brought the tentative agenda for the ER Quarterly meeting to be held on April 12. Ann DuBois will send out a notice to Board members to attend this important meeting.

Dr. Berting said that she has tried to recruit new Committee members. Evelyn Maruska and Angelina Valdez might join this Committee.

The Committee discussed the Long-Term Stewardship special meeting on March 27. The next public meeting will be on May 4 from 5:00 to 9:00 p.m. at the Albuquerque Pueblo Cultural Center. The purpose of the meeting is to gather public input into the Long-Term Stewardship plans for Sandia. Ms. Byrne said that the Site-Specific Advisory Boards (SSABs) would have another national conference about Long-Term Stewardship sometime next October.

Paul Schumann gave some background information on the March 21, 2000 letter from Stu Dinwiddie, from the New Mexico Environment Department (NMED), about Revisions 9 and 10 to the Facilities Compliance Order that required a Site Treatment Plan (STP). In 1995, NMED issued this compliance order. LANL has argued that these restrictions should not apply, with the exception of TA-54 where TRU waste is buried below ground or in a retrievable condition in the tents. This action came from a change in regulations implementing the Resource and Conservation Recovery Act (RCRA). The Site Treatment Plan sets the work schedules for working off the waste that can be shipped to other locations and what material will be capped in place. The consensus was that the Waste Management Committee should work on this issue rather than the Environmental Restoration Committee. Approximately thirty pages of the STP is already in the Citizens' Toolkit. This information could be the beginning of a briefing for the Waste Management Committee.

The Environmental Restoration Committee requested a joint briefing with the Monitoring and Surveillance Committee and the Waste Management Committee to look at the RCRA Facility Investigation Report. This report covers the performance assessment methodology and work to be done at Material Disposal Areas G, H and L. If the performance assessment is accepted, this result means that LANL can do presumptive remedies on the waste that is currently stored at TA-54. Diana Hollis may be the best person to hold this briefing. The meeting might be held on May 8 in Santa Fe. Dr. Berting will talk with Sara Galpin and Anthony Armijo about this joint meeting.

Ted Taylor identified the major issues for the next year. He would like the Board's input into LANL's risk assessment methodology, the pending decisions about the Canyon sediments and the waste decisions at TA-54. In addition to the ongoing consideration of Long-Term Stewardship, the Waste Management Committee is working on TA-54 decisions. The Monitoring and Surveillance Committee is working on the canyon issues. This discussion about the sediments could be added to their agenda. The ER committee could look at the risk assessment methodology. Julie Canepa expressed interest in the Board learning more about how LANL does risk assessment and how NMED sees risk. Dr. Berting said that Board members would be interested in exploring this topic. Ms. Byrne and Dr. Berting will discuss how this learning might happen.

Mr. Schumann offered to put Dr. Berting on the list of invitees for the Colloquium meetings that happen the first Thursday of each month. The plan is to present certain topics that will later be presented at the Quarterly ER meetings. Dr. Berting said that she would attend these events as often as possible.

Dr. Berting will talk with George Chandler about the best way to respond to the Department's response to the Board's recommendation 99-1. A decision will be made about how to proceed before the next Board meeting on April 26.

Mr. Schumann offered to send Dr. Berting an article on Brookhaven learnings written by George Chandler.

ACTIONS

1. Dr. Berting will talk with Sara Galpin and Anthony Armijo about a joint briefing on the RCRA Facility Investigation Report. This report covers the performance assessment methodology and work to be done at Material Disposal Areas G, H and L.
2. Dr. Berting will talk with George Chandler about the best way to respond to the Department's response to the Board's recommendation 99-1.
3. Ms. Byrne and Dr. Berting will discuss how this learning about risk assessment methodology and perceptions about risk might happen.
4. Mr. Schumann offered to send Dr. Berting an article on learnings from Brookhaven written by George Chandler.

Northern New Mexico Citizens' Advisory Board
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Long-Term Stewardship Special Meeting
March 27, 2000

Board Members Present: Anthony Armijo, Fran Berting, George Chandler, Sara Galpin
Ex-Officio Members Present: MJ Byrne, DDFO
Guest: Deborah Griswold Coachman, AL Operations
Staff: Ann DuBois, PWT

Fran Berting welcomed Deborah Griswold to the special meeting. Ms. Griswold explained that the Long-Term Stewardship is a nationally focussed issue. James Werner in the DOE Office of Science and Technology established an office for long-term stewardship. The reason that this topic is in this office is the premise that technology will support the monitoring and surveillance tasks needed for long-term stewardship.

The study required by the Programmatic Environmental Impact Study (PEIS) is due in late June or July 2000. A report on NDAA is also due to Congress in October. The purpose of both documents is to develop plans for the monitoring and surveillance of the DOE sites that have been remediated and closed as of 2006. LANL's section of this report will be a narrative account of their plans because LANL is an ongoing operational site. Dave McInroy, LANL, and Woodie Woodworth, DOE/AL are giving input into this document. The NDAA will effect various parts of DOE and is being coordinated at the Field Management Council level due to its cross-program impact.

DOE Headquarters is developing a roadmap for the technology needs required by long-term stewardship. INEEL is taking the lead in developing this roadmap. The Integrated Planning Analysis and Budgeting national database has to roll up the data from all the sites. This information is updated twice a year and available publicly once a year. The Long-Term Surveillance and Monitoring (LTSM) program goes into effect before stewardship. The understanding of what protects human and environmental health changes over time. Therefore, the program has an ongoing life to respond to these changes in understanding.

Sara Galpin talked about the trust for stewardship activities that was created by Tennessee. The purpose of the trust was to deposit funds now in an interest-bearing account that could be used for stewardship activities in the future. This issue is similar to the pending litigation between the Department and the state of New Mexico.

Ms. Griswold said that long-term stewardship is an activity designed to holistically ensure human health and safety. Surveillance and monitoring are focused on taking samples, surveying the condition of the site and working on possible remedies for those places that have not yet been fully remediated. John Arthur articulated a vision of zero new wastes being developed at DOE sites. Mr. Arthur is very supportive of long-term stewardship. He took this issue to the Albuquerque Mission Council and they approved this vision. This vision was announced at the Pollution Prevention Conference held in Albuquerque. The understanding is that whoever generates the waste has the responsibility to clean it up for the duration of the waste's life cycle.

Ms. Griswold said that a team is developing a white paper on the issues involved in long-term stewardship on non-Environmental Management sites e.g., those sites that have an ongoing operational mission. The white paper addresses issues like who is the landlord for on-going activities after 2013-2015. The Defense Program has its mission and its responsibilities. The team will identify the issues to be considered during April to mid-May. The team will also make recommendations. The Office of the Secretary will make the final decisions. Ms. Griswold is the Albuquerque representative on this national team. The web site for this activity is www.em.doe.gov/lts. The local team includes representatives from Kansas City, Sandia, LANL, and Pentax. The planning horizon is 2070 because the software cannot go beyond that date.

Ms. Griswold explained that technology development is a high priority for Albuquerque and all the DOE sites. DOE has a scientific culture which is an advantage to developing new technology. The Office of Science and Technology funds these highly competitive projects. More projects than Environmental Management compete for this funding. Since Albuquerque Operations is the end user of this technology, they have to vouch that there is a need for this technology. Deployment funding is available to roll out these projects. The Department has little money for pure science. The EPA also has technology seed projects. However, the EPA does not plan to implement the projects and the timeframe for success is very short.

The Department must abide by the regulatory authority governing stewardship activities. These regulations include the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA), the Clean Air Act, the Clean Water Act and the Safe Drinking Water Act. The local RCRA Permits and the Post-Closure Care Permits act as regulatory drivers. While Albuquerque Operations is not a party to these Permits, they must be involved in the final decisions. The Programmatic Environmental Impact Statement does not have any regulatory drivers. The purpose of the PEIS was to examine the local impacts of DOE operations.

The Senior Steering Group works with the New Mexico Environment Department (NMED). This Group involves parties like Kirkland Air Force Base, Sandia and LANL. The purpose is to look at long-term stewardship issues. Sandia is the first major site to finish its corrective actions. Sandia is looking at a RCRA-driven plan. LANL is involved because this experience will be applied later to LANL. NMED will apply these learnings to other facilities in the state not just DOE sites. Sandia is cooperating with stakeholders to include their input into the decisions. On May 4 from 5:00 to 9:00 p.m. at

the Pueblo Cultural Center, the first public participation session will be held. The Northern New Mexico Citizens' Advisory Board is invited, as is the Sandia Citizens' Advisory Board.

Long-term stewardship means that the Department maintains ownership. The Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA) is very clear about ownership and the joint and several liability requirements. Due to the liability issue, DOE is aware of the impact on changing technology on keeping adequate records. The Department is developing a decision tree for what happens when the technology changes and the records could be lost.

The Department is also looking at all the legal mandates and the Congressional funding patterns. The Super Fund Act requires a review every five years. The EPA has to approve whatever corrective action is taken to ensure that it is the right remedy for this particular site. The Super Fund was created because no other party was available to do the cleanup. LANL is not a Super Fund site. RCRA does not mandate a review every five years. Albuquerque could mandate that this review schedule become policy. Headquarters might institute a similar policy.

Ms. Byrne reminded the Board members that there would be a Site-Specific Advisory Board Stewardship II Conference in October. This national conference will convene to articulate cross-site concerns. A DOE-wide policy on stewardship is needed after the Environmental Restoration corrective actions are taken at each site. Separate consideration is needed for those sites that have an on-going operational mission. A possible conference outcome might be a joint resolution with all the SSABs on this topic.

Ms. Griswold invited Board members to attend the annual stewardship meeting sponsored by Grand Junction. She will inform the Board about when the meeting will be held.

Ms. Galpin discussed the links between the stewardship issues and the DOE conference she attended on land use. Real estate specialists and the Environmental Law Institute attended this conference. The participants heard a report that all efforts to preserve land use records had failed. She was concerned about the implications of this experience for long-term stewardship.

The Board members expressed their appreciation for Ms. Griswold's presentation. Ms. Griswold said that she looked forward to working more closely with the Board members.

TASKS COMPLETED IN APRIL
BY RAY J. ARMENTA

I contacted George Chandler and Jim Johnston to see who would be willing to help me do a presentation to the Santa Fe High Students on April 18, Earth Day Celebration. Our Topic would be the mission of the NNM CAB.

I have spoken several times with Mr. Gene Gallegos of the Northern New Mexico Community College Math & Science Department and informed him that Fran Berting and I will be attending their April 27 meeting and would make a presentation on the mission of the NNM CAB.

I followed up on MJ's request that I contact the Plaza Hotel about the two weeks cancellation. I spoke with Chris Morgan who checked with the Manager and then called me back and stated that they were willing to hold the rooms up to two weeks before, then it would be up to each individual to make their own reservation.

I told him that he had not yet, and he said that he had instructed him to be in contact with regarding setting up a time for the NNM CAB doing a presentation to the Math & Science Department. He then said that he would follow up on it and that someone would be contacting me.

I spoke with Nancy Romero who called to let the CAB office know that we now have an 800 number, which is (800)218-2761. A Kate Cordova from Los Alamos called as well to confirm it.

I called Evelyn Maruska and left condolences on behalf of the Board for the loss of her sister-in-law who got killed on Monday by a drunk driver.

I called the Hotel Loretto to make reservations for Menice Manzanares, however when I was asked what was the organization's name I was calling under for a discount rate, they could not find us having made reservations for any conference room and the person who answered asked me whom it had been made with. I told her it was made with Ms. Angie Cross by Jim Johnston.

I spoke to Ms. Cross who I had also confirmed the 26th of April with and she said that she remembered but would have to check on something and then call me back, when she did she gave me a rate of \$99.00 plus tax.

I spoke with the Santa Fe County Commissioners' office regarding a presentation to the County Commissioners. I was told that the next Commissioners meeting is on April 25 and that I should submit a letter requesting to be on the agenda by April 11th. I wrote the letter and made such a request.

I met with Angie Cross and Leah Gaba from the Hotel Loretto in an effort to clear up the confusion about our reservations for they had not been able to find us on their calendar. I called the Hotel Loretto to make reservations for Menice Manzanares, Dr. James Alarid and Anthony Armijo. However, once more the reservation desk had a problem not being able to find us listed for any conference, and gave a rate of \$149.00. I called Ray Gallegos of Radio KDCE to see if we could do our monthly radio talk show, however he stated that he was booked for this month, but that I should call him for May.

I called Ian Hoffman regarding some publicity on the good things that the Board has accomplished in the last two years. He said that he would be willing to write such a story, however that he first would like to educate himself more on this before he would do it and that he would also like to attend some board meetings. I told him that this was an opportune time for him to do this because the meeting for this month is being held here at the Hotel Loretto. He said he didn't promise to be there because he is very busy with the MolyCorp business in Questa but for me to make sure to call him in May.

I have put in a call to Joe Lopez Rio Arriba County Commissioners Coordinator for those wishing to be put on the agenda to speak to the Commissioners, asking that the NNM CAB be put on their May meeting agenda and I will follow up with a letter to Mr. Lorenzo Valdez, their County Manager making such a request.

I have also called the Town of Espanola and spoke with Rene Archuleta, the City Clerk requesting time for the NNM CAB to make a presentation to the City Council. She asked me to write a letter to the Mayor of Espanola and make such a request for such a presentation in May.

I have also called the town of Taos, and spoke with Rene Lucero, City Clerk, requesting that the NNM CAB be put on their agenda for one of their City Council meetings in May.

I attended the DOE Mandatory Stand Down in Los Alamos on April 12, 2000.

I faxed M. J. Connie T. Ortega letter of resignation.

I spoke with Angelina Valdez and asked her if she would like to do a [presentation with me on the mission of the NNM CAB to the Espanola City Council on May 2, at 6:00 p.m. She said that she would like to do this.

I wrote a letter to the Rio Arriba County requesting that the NNM CAB be put on their agenda for their next County Commissioners meeting. I have not heard back from them yet. I will be soliciting a Board member to assist with this presentation.

I spoke to Evelyn Maruska and invited her to accompany Angelina Valdez and myself on May 2nd, for the presentation to the Espanola City Council and she said that she would also like to.

I called the town of Taos and spoke with Ms. Rene Lucero and requested that the NNM CAB be put on their next City Council's agenda so that we can make a presentation to them on the mission of the NNM CAB. I was asked to write a letter to the Mayor and I did. Right now it looks like this will be happening on May 16 at 6:30 p.m. I asked Ms. Menice, Chair of the NNM CAB if she would be willing to do this presentation with me and she said she did.

Mr. Joe Lopez from the County of Rio Arriba called me back and said that we could do our presentation to the County Commissioners in Tierra Amarilla, and that in fact he wanted to invite us to the opening of the Grand Opening of the New County Court House in Tierra Amarilla on April 26th, and that the Commissioners meeting would be right after the reception.
