

## Buses might get security cameras

Santa Fe buses will get surveillance cameras if the City Council approves.

Santa Fe Trails Director Tom Williams said he began looking into the cameras after a rider stabbed a bus driver in April. The assailant was never apprehended, and the driver remains on workers compensation, he said.

"We have drivers who are accosted by unruly passengers all the time, but this was the first incident like this," he said. "We were all locked with this coming so soon after 9/11. This is to protect our drivers."

Williams said he is seeking approval to purchase 25 cameras and videotape units for \$25,443 through Zia Bus Sales, which could install them near the front of each city bus by February. The city Public Works Committee approved the request Monday. The city Finance Committee will consider the request before it goes to the full council.

## Old mortar found in Los Alamos

LOS ALAMOS — Fire engines and ambulances sealed off a residential street here for more than two hours while a bomb squad figured out how to safely move an old mortar to deactivate it.

A resident called police Monday afternoon to say he had stumbled upon a suspicious looking object while hiking in the White Rock Canyon area, brought it home and left it in his yard.

Authorities blocked off the north-side neighborhood while members of the bomb squad examined the weapon. It turned out not to be a live weapon, but members of the bomb squad didn't know that until they removed it.

"It was an old military ordnance 60-inch mortar," Los Alamos Police Department Cpl. Federico Rascon said. "The reporting party said he had seen the date '1954' on the shell." The mortar was moved under police escort to the Los Alamos Sportsmen's Club, where it was countercharged and opened.
