NNMCAB Member Ralph Phelps to Present at the 2013 Waste Management Conference in Phoenix Arizona

Mr. Ralph Phelps will be speaking on two panels at the 2013 Waste Management Conference held in Phoenix, Arizona. The conference hosted by WM Symposia has long been considered the premier international conference on management of radioactive material. The first Waste Management Conference sponsored by the University of Arizona was held in Tucson in 1974 and covered high-level waste. The conference has expanded to cover additional areas of radioactive waste and moved to Phoenix where the non-profit organization WM Symposia and its affiliates host this prestigious conference.

Each year the WM conference features one country and one DOE site. At the 2013

conference the featured country is Canada; the featured U.S. Department of Energy site is Idaho National Laboratory.

Mr. Phelps will be participating on the Effectiveness of Advisory Boards; the DOE-EM Site Specific Advisory Board Experience panel. He will be presenting a paper that covers Working Effectively with Technical and Non-Technical Board Members.

The second panel that Mr. Phelps has been asked to sit will be moderated by Los Alamos National Laboratory. The Panel will be talking about management of fires, with focus on the Las Conchas fire and its effect on getting Transuranic waste removed from Material Disposal Area G. The panel will cover the Cerro Grande fire however with less emphasis than that of the more recent fire.

Mr. Doug Sayre will also be in attendance at the conference to represent the NNM CAB. Both Mr. Sayre and Mr. Phelps will be attending talks and visiting the expo, looking to acquire information and resources that the NNM CAB can use in its recommendations to the Department of Energy.

LANL's Public Reading Room Has New Home


In the Summer of 2012 the LANL Public Reading Room which resided at Technical Area 3 in the Research Library, was moved to its new home at the Citizens' Advisory Board Office. The new, more centralized location provides the public with easier access to the documents and media that reside in the Reading Room. Required by LANL's RCRA permit, the Reading

Room houses documents authored by LANL's Environmental Division. New documents are added weekly, expanding an inventory that dates back to the 80's.

Visitors now have on site access to electronic media and the Electronic Public Reading Room.

Mission of the EM-SAAB

The EM SSAB was created to involve stakeholders more directly in DOE EM cleanup decisions. When stakeholders want to share information and become involved in the environmental decision-making process, the cleanup activities at Federal facilities benefit. This involvement helps agencies make cost-efficient and environmentally sound decisions, which lead to faster, safer cleanups.

In accordance with its charter, the EM SSAB exists to provide the Assistant Secretary for Environmental Management, the appropriate Site Manager(s), and any other DOE officials the Assistant Secretary designates, with information, advice, and recommendations concerning issues affecting the EM Program at various sites. Specifically, at the request of the Assistant Secretary or the Site Managers, the Board may provide advice and recommendations concerning

the following EM site-specific issues: clean-up standards and environmental restoration; waste management and disposition; stabilization and disposition of non-stockpile nuclear materials; excess facilities; future land use and long term stewardship; risk assessment and management; and clean-up science and technology activities.

The EM SSAB's activities are governed by the Federal Advisory Committee Act (FACA), which was enacted to ensure that the general public has access to advisory board deliberations and recommendations. While only one FACA-chartered EM SSAB exists, 8 local boards have been organized under its umbrella charter. They include the Hanford Advisory Board, Idaho National Laboratory Citizens Advisory Board, Northern New Mexico Citizens' Advisory Board, Nevada SSAB, Oak Ridge SSAB, Savannah River

Site Citizens Advisory Board, Portsmouth SSAB and Paducah Citizens Advisory Board.

Local site Board membership, which reflects a full diversity of views, cultures, and demographics from affected communities and regions, is composed primarily of people who are directly affected by site cleanup activities. Members include stakeholders from local governments, Tribal Nations, environmental and civic groups, labor organizations, universities, industry, and other interested citizens.







NNMCAB Combined Committee Current Project

The Waste Management Committee and the Environmental Monitoring, Surveillance and Remediation Committee are currently working to draft a recommendation to DOE on the 33 Shafts. The 33 Shafts are located at Los Alamos National Laboratory in Area G. This recommendation was voted on and passed with amendments at the January 30th 2013 Board meeting, at Buffalo Thunder Resort.

Take Part in the Decision Process, Be a Part of the Board

The Northern New Mexico Citizens' Advisory Board (NNMCAB) is one of eight Site-Specific Advisory Boards established to involve local citizens in the Department of Energy (DOE) decision process at its Nuclear Facilities. The NNMCAB provides DOE with recommendations and advice on legacy waste at Los Alamos National Laboratory. These recommendations are drafted by the Board or by the two NNMCAB committees. Members of the public can serve on the Waste Management Committee or the Environmental Monitoring, and Remediation Committee, and work in conjunction with Board members to draft recommendations. Once drafted the Board must, consider the recommendation during a full Board meeting before the recommendation is submitted to DOE.

The NNMCAB has six bi-monthly meetings annually, each at a different venue in Northern New Mexico. The meetings are open to the public and feature public comment periods, designed to allow the citizens to express their concerns or ask questions of the board and liaison members. Members of the public can

sign-up in advance for the public comment period, or ask to address the board during the public comment period.

The Board meetings also strive to provide the public with valuable information, often in the form of presentations presented by a range of sources: DOE, NMED, New Mexico Department of Health, LANL, non-government organizations, and special guests.
