## Subject: Amendment to Discharge Permit Application DP-1835

In April 2015 the U.S. Department of Energy and Los Alamos National Security, LLC (DOE/LANS) submitted a discharge permit application (DP-1835) to inject treated groundwater into multiple Class V Underground Injection Control (UIC) wells at Los Alamos National Laboratory (ENV-DO-15-0085). Following discussions with the New Mexico Environment Department (NMED) on May 11, 2016, DOE/LANS proposed to add perchlorate monitoring to the discharge permit application's sampling plan. Perchlorate is present within the chromium plume and could potentially be in groundwater pumped from the extraction wells described in discharge permit application DP-1835. Perchlorate and other collocated constituents (e.g., nitrate) that may be present in pumped groundwater are expected to be below New Mexico Water Quality Control Commission groundwater standards prior to treatment. Any perchlorate pumped from extraction wells will be treated by the same ion exchange (IX) resin used to remove chromium and nitrate prior to injection. Routinely monitoring the treated water for perchlorate will provide assurance of permit compliance and also provide valuable information on treatment efficiency.



Section B-13 of the April 2015 Discharge Permit Application referenced above contains a table titled, *Proposed Discharge Quality Compliance Monitoring Plan.* DOE/LANS propose to add perchlorate (ClO<sub>4</sub>) to the analytes list. A revised table is presented below.
