Good afternoon:

Per the requirements of the OCD Discharge Permit to report any presence of water in "dry" wells the following wells were discovered to have a water level.

On 9/16/10 at 0937 hours, during my quarterly inspection of the GWM wells around aeration lagoon 2 and evaporation pond 1, I discovered a water level in GWM-3 at a depth of 16.92 feet. Depth to bottom of this well is 17.94 feet, with a water level of 1.02 feet. I first bailed out 800 ml of water and used the next 800 ml of water from the well for samples. After samples were taken, the total amount of water that I could bail out of the well is 2800 ml of water with a remaining level of 0.15 feet. Water was clear to slightly cloudy in color and no odor detected.

GWM-2: At 0945 hours, discovered a water level at a depth of 17.3 feet. Total depth of well is 18.97 feet, with a water level of 1.67 feet. I first bailed out 1600 ml of water and used the next 800 ml of water from this well to collect samples. After samples were taken, the total amount of water that I could bail out of the well was 3200 ml of water with a remaining level of 0.1 feet. Water was clear to slightly cloudy in color and no odor detected.

Samples collected were for the following parameters: VOC, BTEX +MTBE, GRO/DRO, Major Cations/Anions per the Ground Water Monitoring Schedule. Samples will be shipped Federal Express this afternoon to Hall Laboratories for analysis. Please advise if additional testing or monitoring is required for these two wells.
